Purpose: Developing and evolving the policies and regulations to enable the development, upgrading & decarbonisation of port infrastructure to make them the building blocks of the UK's FLOW and CP2030 ambitions

Key priorities (2025-2027)

Develop policy positions, consultation responses, messaging and thought leadership to:

- Maximise the catalytic role of govt investment at pace including NWF (£5.8bn-ports one of 5 "foundational industries" in Industrial Strategy)/TCE/GBE funding and ensure FLOWMIS works (budget, pace) for ports.
- Develop policy positions regarding funding mechanisms, namely a longerterm revenue support mechanism, to derisk port infrastructure investment and align port upgrades with sector demands
- Develop a facilitative planning regime and make Biodiversity Net Gain (currently disproportionately costly and prohibitive to development) work for ports
- Overcome challenges to deliver net zero port infrastructure: develop policy to ports decarbonise their own operations and shipping as part of wide UK Maritime Decarbonisation Strategy. Challenges include grid capacity and industrial power costs.
